

Paper presented






Radiology in the United States



Augustus Crane, MD





Augustus Crane, MD

Born 1868 Adrian, MI

Majored in literature at University of Michigan

MD 1894 University of Michigan

Practiced medicine in Kalamazoo

Fall, 1896 Built an x-ray unit

March 1899 Published first of more than 40 papers



James Garrit Van Zwaluwenburg, MD


Enthusiastic

Died 1922 - pneumonia





Left theology for medicine


MD 1888 University of Michigan

Chest radiographs with 1/4 second exposure

Challenged at ARRS in 1902

Measured response

Provided proof with site visit




Lessons Learned

Practiced as surgeon in Battle Creek

Travelled in Europe with Father-in-Law





Son of Methodist Minister

University of Michigan - A.B.

Detroit College of Medicine - M.D.



Worked as pathologist and otolaryngologist Harper, Children's and Detroit Receiving Hospitals

Professor at Detroit College of Medicine

Passionate photographer

Turned his attention to radiology



Founded Roentgen Society of USA

Many non-physicians, vendors, etc.

Reorganized it as ARRS with criteria for membership (submit 100 reports to assure quality)

First editor of American Quarterly of Roentgenology (precursor of AJR)



Succeeded van Zwaluwenburg as Michigan Chair of Radiology

Expanded the department

Developed radiation protection measures

Enhanced education

Affectionately referred to as "Pops"



Transformed ARRS to premier US radiology society

Founding editor of precursor of AJR

President, ARRS

Gold Medalist, RSNA

President, ACR



Enthusiastic teacher

- 3. Hospital pays expenses of department
- 4. Hospital supplements income of radiologist
