MRS Membership Summary (2022–2026)

Overall Membership

- Membership grew steadily from 2022 (1,429) to a peak in 2025 (1,522).
- In 2026, membership declined to 1,471 (**down 51 members / ~3.3%** from 2025).
- This is the first notable decrease in several years.

Physician Members (Primary Revenue Group)

- Physician Full members declined from **659 (2022) to 597 (2026)**.
- This represents a loss of **62 members (~9.4%)** over five years.
- This is the most significant area of decline and impacts overall membership stability.

Members-in-Training (Pipeline Growth)

- Medical Students increased from **95 (2022) to 150 (2026)**.
- Residents increased from **263 (2022) to 305 (2026)**.

- Transitional Year members also show steady growth.

Key takeaway: The pipeline is strong and growing.

Retention Insight

- While trainee membership is increasing, full physician membership is decreasing.
 - This suggests a **drop-off after training**, indicating a retention/conversion issue rather than a recruitment issue.
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Retired Members

- Retired physician membership increased slightly from **195 (2022) to 209 (2026)**.
 - This group remains stable but does not drive growth.
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Summary

- Membership growth peaked in 2025 and declined slightly in 2026.
 - The organization is successfully attracting students and residents.
 - However, fewer members are transitioning into long-term physician membership.
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Recommended Focus

- Improve retention of early-career physicians (first 1–3 years post-training).
 - Strengthen transition from trainee to full member.
 - Continue supporting trainee engagement while adding strategies for long-term membership retention.
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Bottom Line

MRS has a strong and growing training pipeline but is experiencing a decline in full physician members, highlighting the need to focus on retention and conversion of early-career physicians.
